

I loved Thanksgiving, and still do – but it is not about any of these things. The truth about Thanksgiving is quite the opposite, as William Jennings Bryan wrote: "On Thanksgiving we

celebrate our dependence."

When the Mayflower arrived at Plymouth Rock in October of 1620, it carried 102 passengers. That first winter was brutal and most stayed on the ship; only 53 survived to move ashore in March – where they met an Abinaki tribesman who greeted them in English! He had been taught by Squanto, from the Pawtuxet tribe, who had been kidnapped by an English Sea Captain, sold into slavery, and then somehow made it out of London and returned home on an exploratory mission. Despite his experiences with Englishmen, Squanto taught the Pilgrims, weakened by malnutrition and illness, how to survive. He showed them how to

ONLY WHEN WE KNOW BOTH THE STARTING POINT AND THE DESTINATION CAN WE SET A COURSE.

We all try to plan for the future. On a small scale, we remember to take something out of the freezer in the morning so that we can make dinner, or we make plans for the weekend days in advance. On a longer range scale, we save for our children's education or for retirement. We take courses to improve ourselves and maybe get a better position at work. All of these are things we do now to make things better or easier at some point in the future.

The Temple is no different. We are always planning. On a short-term scale, we prepare programs and activities weeks to months in advance. We prepare a budget so that we'll know what we can - and can't - do during the coming year. We put funds away for major repairs to our building. Strategic planning is something that is more difficult. Yet it is every bit as important as the day-to-day or year-to-year plans that we are so used to making. If we don't make decisions about where we want to be in the future, we may find as that future arrives we simply are not prepared to do the things we want to do. That is the fundamental principle of our Vision 2020 strategic planning project: figuring out what we need to do now in order to do the things we believe we are going to want to do in the future.

There are two significant things we need to figure out as part of this process.

Clearly, we need to determine where we want to be in a few years. But that isn't enough. We also need to know where we are now. Only when we know both the starting point and the destination can we set a course. That is what we are trying to do with Vision 2020.

We spent a good deal of time working on "Where are we now?" trying to get input from as many of you as possible through house meetings and a series of face-to-face discussions. "Where do we want to be?" is just as difficult a question to answer, and has occupied our research groups for the past several months. Now it is time for all of us to become engaged in the process again.

The research groups are presenting their findings to the Board and to the Congregation. For the first part of the Board meeting in each of the next few months, we will devote an hour to an hour and a half to one or two of the research topics. Please try to make time to attend these sessions. The Board meets on the first Thursday of each month. The topics will be announced in advance and materials will be made available to all interested congregants.

Planning takes on an entirely different meaning for outdoor activities. I love being outdoors. It doesn't bother me if the temperature isn't just right, or if it's windy or cloudy. I don't mind a little rain or snow. (Thunderstorms are a different story. I stay indoors for those. Ask me about that.) I find being outdoors in different

Little People and Polling Places

I will never forget Election Day 2016. Granted, many of us might say that.

But the memories I'm talking about have little to do with politics (though I can recall plenty of those memories, too) and everything to do with dragging two tiny people with me to the polls.

Allow me to set the scene: I was 86 weeks pregnant (ok 36), and I foolishly attempted to beat the lunchtime crowds by waddling into my polling place at 11am with my nearly 2 and 4-year-olds in tow. Rookie mistake—it was nearly their lunch time. They proceeded to terrorize my fellow Americans with screams and spilled snacks while we waited in line. Nothing kills the feeling of shared civic responsibility quite like hysterics over pretzels.

Then came the magic. Nope, not the voting. The sticker.

And with the help of that ever-celebrated

"I Voted" sticker, a second miracle occurred. My oldest child managed to ask some pretty astute questions as she took it all in.

"Mommy, what does the President do? Mommy, did you vote for the boy or the girl?" Her curiosity continued.

It turns out, it's not just Uncle Sam who wants you to vote. Many rabbis say that voting is not only a right for Jewish people, but also an obligation. The Talmud also teaches that if a community is split on an issue, the people should vote. Kids can understand that the act of voting is about carefully choosing who is best positioned to lead our communities, and they can have some surprisingly insightful ideas about values and priorities - even if they don't quite have the defense budget or healthcare plan mastered. Voting with our children also shows them firsthand the freedom we enjoy and the responsibility that comes with it.

next generation to vote is to bring them to the polls with you. Even the youngest ones can learn something, such as the importance of process and rules. Not only can your children come into the voting booth with you, but, apparently, it's even okay to let them push the buttons and cast your vote. (If only I had known.)

I took my kids with me in 2016 out of necessity, but this year - Tuesday November 6, 2018 to be exact - I will take them by choice.

There is, inevitably, one small problem. Maryland law only allows a voter to take two children under 18 in with them. Anyone want to babysit my almost 2-year-old? And candidates, if you're listening, I know an awful lot of eligible voters who might check the name for the person promising to change that.

Eighth graders will look at "Comparative Judaism," which will touch upon beliefs, practices and developments of the major movements in American Judaism. Ninth graders will look at Comparative Religions with regard to the three "Abrahamic" religions (Judaism, Christianity and Islam). Tenth graders will explore issues relating to Jewish identity and "Why I am Jewish" in the clergy-led Confirmation class. Eleventh graders will look at ways to engage in acts of social justice and the role of social justice in

Reform Judaism, and seniors will talk about Jewish life beyond high school. We try to include special guest speakers and trips in each of these curricula. These "Core 2" lessons are interwoven monthly with our "Core 1" large-scale program nights and our elective nights.

TBAHigh meets on Tuesday evenings from 6:30 - 8:00 pm, with an optional pizza dinner every week from 6:00 - 6:30 pm. If your teen has not yet signed up for TBAHigh, we invite him/her to come try it. Friday evening November 9th at 7:00 pm is the first of our TBAHigh Shabbat services. We invite and encourage ALL teens to join us for services and a special oneg.

Looking for People to Join TBA's Delegation to the 2019 Consultation on Conscience

Jeanne Kahn and Mark Joffe will lead a delegation from the Temple to the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism's (RAC) Consultation on Conscience, to be held at the Grand Hyatt in Washington, DC, from May 19–21, 2019. The Consultation on Conscience is the RAC's biennial social justice leadership conference and is dedicated to training and empowering Jewish leaders to make real, lasting change at the local, state, and national levels. TBA members who attended previous Consultations found the speakers dynamic and the programs inspirational. Social justice issues addressed in the past included civil rights, voting rights, transgender rights, prison reform, and environmental issues.

At the 2019 Consultation, TBA's delegation will work together to build meaningful connections, learn and enhance skills needed to advocate for social change, and deepen our knowledge of today's critical issues. We will also have the opportunity to talk with representatives from other temples and establish relationships moving forward. The Consultation will include both plenary sessions that offer in-depth, Jewish conversations about pressing contemporary issues and workshops designed to meet TBA's social justice needs and interests.

The RAC is offering a deeply discounted registration fee of \$249 for those who register between November 1 and November 23. (The registration fee increases considerably after those dates.) cultivate corn, extract sap from maple trees, catch fish in the rivers and avoid poisonous plants. He also helped them forge an alliance with the Wampanoag tribe that lasted more than 50 years. Tragically, this is one of the only examples of harmony between European colonists and Native Americans.

In November 1621, Governor William Bradford organized a three-day feast after a successful harvest which was certainly quite different from the meals we share today and probably wasn't even called Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving Days were declared periodically on very different dates for different reasons throughout the colonial period and by several Presidents, including Washington. However, Thanksgiving did not take root as a national holiday until 1863, when Lincoln declared it for the last Thursday in November. His proclamation, made as the nation tore itself apart with a bloody civil war, stated the purpose was to, "commend to his tender care all those who have become widows, orphans, mourners or sufferers in the lamentable civil strife," and to, "heal the wounds of the nation." Every president followed with a similar annual declaration until in 1939, FDR made the date of celebration one week earlier — where it remains today.

Why would President Lincoln establish a national holiday of Thanksgiving in a time of war?

Perhaps gratitude is exactly the right thing to cultivate after or even during the horrors of war. Gratitude and hatred cannot coexist in a person at the same time – it is very hard to fight a war or hold a grudge when filled with a sense of gratitude.

Lincoln's proclamation did not stop the Civil War, but it remains a precious gift. And our Jewish tradition takes this one step further, teaching that we need constant reminders to cultivate the kind of gratitude which can wear down hatred and replace it with joy.

Here are just a few of things we can all try to make every day Thanksgiving, and to do so without any need for elastic waistbands!

- 1. From the liturgy: start the day with Modeh Ani before you even brush your teeth in the morning, take a moment to offer thanks for this new day, recognizing that it is not to be taken for granted, but is, in fact, a precious gift.
- 2. A Shabbat Meditation: during Shabbat close your eyes and review the week which you have just lived. Even if was a difficult or dark week, try to find those moments which were beautiful, label them and offer your thanks.
- Say "thank you" as often as you can and mean it!

The more we can cultivate gratitude in our lives, the wealthier we will be according to the rabbis – for gratitude is the currency of truewealth.

Finally, for those times where we really feel the need to get even, here are some parting words of wisdom from outside of our tradition: "The only people with whom you should try to get even are those who have helped you." – John E. Southard

This November, may every day be Thanksgiving, and may we all celebrate the countless joys and blessings of our lives.

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
