## **CLERGY MESSAGE FROM** *Rabbi Luxemburg and Rabbi Pokras*



Following the conclusion of the first World Zionist Congress held in Basel, Switzerland in August of 1897, Theodore Hertzl, the founder of the organization and father of modern political Zionism, wrote the following:

"At Basel I founded the Jewish State. If I said this out loud today, I would be greeted by universal laughter. In five years perhaps, and certainly in fifty years, everyone will perceive it." (Hertzl, September 3, 1987)

In the whole of Jewish history, this statement is one of the most prophetic. On May 14, 1948, just a bit more than fifty years after his prediction, the modern state of Israel declared its independence. After 2000 years, our people were once again established among the family of nations, a people free and sovereign in our own land.

We often wonder what Hertzl ... bold journalist and political visionary ... would think about Israel, 2020. We imagine he would be puzzled by its politics, proud of its many accomplishments, and be challenging the Israel of today to realize the vision and values that were put forward at that first momentous meeting in 1897 and enshrined in Israel's Declaration of Independence:

"The State of Israel ... will foster the development of the country for the benefit of all its inhabitants; it will be based on freedom, justice and peace as envisaged by the prophets of Israel; it will ensure complete equality of social and political rights to all its inhabitants irrespective of religion, race or sex; it will guarantee freedom of religion, conscience, language, education and culture; it will safeguard the Holy Places of all religions; and it will be faithful to the principles of the Charter of the United Nations."

The 38<sup>th</sup> World Zionist Congress will convene in Jerusalem in October of 2020. In order for Hertzl's vision and the values of the Israeli Declaration of Independence to be both protected

## Historic Torah Scroll at Temple Beth Ami



During World War II, when the Nazis invaded Czechoslovakia, they gathered an enormous number of Torah scrolls and mantles, and other ritual items. Their intent at the time was to use these items to set up a museum of a lost race. When the War ended, Czechoslovakia and other European nations were in dire financial difficulty, and were doing everything they could to raise money. The Czechoslovakian government attempted to sell their large collection of Torah scrolls to Israel, but the two sides couldn't come to an agreement, so the scrolls stayed in Czechoslovakia.

In the 1960s, a Czech company approached Eric Estorick, an art dealer who had been to Prague frequently, about purchasing some scrolls. Mr. Estorick asked one of his clients, Ralph Yablon, who then discussed this with Harold Reinhart, the Rabbi of the Westminster Synagogue in London. Following an inspection of the scrolls to verify their

authenticity and evaluate their condition, Mr. Yablon agreed to fund the purchase of 1.564 scrolls.

A team of sofrim (scribes) examined the scrolls to see which ones were kosher, which ones could be repaired and restored, and which ones were in such bad condition that they could only be used as a memorial. The Memorial Scrolls Trust was set up, and Torah scrolls started being allocated on loan to communities and organizations worldwide.

By the late 1990s, most of the scrolls had been allocated and delivered. Around this time, Mike and Gail Kaltman, long-time congregants of Temple Beth Ami, were travelling to London. Mike had read about the scrolls in a Jewish publication, he was the chair of our Fine Arts Committee, and we had recently moved into our new building. He knew that the committee was looking for something to display in our Memorial alcove, and thought one of these scrolls would be perfect.

The Kaltmans discovered that most of the remaining scrolls were in very poor condition, but they found a few that were in good enough condition to be used as a display. Mike took photos of the three scrolls he thought would be best, and noted that Scroll #57 had particularly nice calligraphy. Upon their return home, a decision was made, with financial support from the Norwitz family, to acquire that scroll (on loan) for Temple Beth Ami.

The scroll was housed in our Ark for many



## THE WORLD ZIONIST ORGANIZATION AND WORLD ZIONIST CONGRESS

THE WORLD ZIONIST CONGRESS (WZC) IS A REPRESENTATIVE BODY OF THE WORLD'S JEWISH PEOPLE.

Established by Theodor Herzl in 1897, the Zionist Congress (as it was originally known) was the legislative body of the World Zionist Organization (WZO), a non-governmental entity that promotes Zionism. Today, the two bodies are known respectively as the World Zionist Congress (WZC) and the World Zionist Organization (WZO).

The WZC, also known as the Parliament of the Jewish People, comprises 500 delegates and meets in Jerusalem every five years. It enables delegates to exert ideological influence on both Israeli society and the global Jewish agenda, as well as allocate financial and other resources to various organizations – including the Reform Movement – in Israel.

Currently, the United States has 145 delegates in the WZC, the largest single delegation outside Israel. Thanks to a robust turnout in the 2015 elections, 56 of the 145 delegates (39 percent) represent the Reform Movement and, as a result, have been able to ensure that more than \$4 million a year (\$20 million over five years) is being directed to the Israeli Reform Movement. By comparison, the Israeli government annually provides nearly 4 billion NIS (\$1.1 billion) to Orthodox and Haredi institutions in Israel.

A strong election turnout among North America's Reform Jews and our supporters and allies will ensure that financial resources will continue to flow to our Israeli movement – including Reform congregations and institutions. It also will allow us to fill leadership positions in some of Israel's national institutions, including the World Zionist Organnization (WZO), the jewish Agency for Israel, and Keren Kayemeth LeIsrael – Jewish National Fund (KKL-JNF). A leadership role in KKL-JNF will enable us to ensure that decisions about government and public spending over the Green Line, including land purchases, reflect the Reform Movement's values and positions. Only in this way can we continue to build a democratic society in Israel that truly reflects the Jewish values we hold dear: pluralism, equality, economic justice, and peace.

What's more, because JAFI and the WZO support programs of the World Union for Progressive (WUPJ), high voter turnout will provide support for WUPJ congregations and for Netzer Olami and Tamar, which offer programming for Progressive Jewish youth and young adults in communities around the world.

VOTING WILL BE QUICK AND EASY. All voting will be completed online and will be accessible from mobile devices. It is a simple process and will take only a few minutes. This year, in 2020 we hope to have an even stronger representation and look forward to all Reform Jews in the United States to stand up and be counted!

#### MONTHLY CHAPEL SHABBAT SERVICE PLEASE COME JOIN US AS WE BEGIN OUR 16<sup>th</sup> YEAR!

Isn't it time for you to join fellow TBA congregants at the monthly TBA Shabbat morning 10:30 AM service held the second Saturday of each month in the chapel? Isn't it time you celebrated Shabbat in a warm, intimate setting, usually with TBA clergy, where you can enjoy a meaningful religious service, schmooze with other congregants, and have a pleasurable Kiddush lunch following the service? Yes, we have just begun the 16<sup>th</sup> year of these monthly Shabbat chapel services! Yes, they have become an important part of TBA religious life! Yes, those who regularly attend have come to look forward to them with great anticipation. Yes, this could be you!

Moreover, the monthly chapel service offers congregants the opportunity to actively participate in a Shabbat service if they so choose, for example, they can chant Torah, chant or read Haftorah, or deliver a D'var Torah. Often, the Torah reading is followed by a clergy-led discussion of its meaning and applicability to our everyday lives. The monthly chapel service also offers congregants the opportunity to celebrate joyful life-cycle events such as a baby naming, Auf Ruf, or a special birthday or wedding anniversary. And of course, the service provides a venue for saying kaddish when observing sheloshim or a yahrzeit.

The Kiddush lunch following the service is an important part of the Shabbat celebration and is prepared by different volunteers each month (usually two individuals or families). The lunches provide one and all the opportunity to catch up on the news of the day whatever it might be, to discuss important (and not so important) issues, and to otherwise schmooze.



The dates of the next six 2020 second Saturday-of-each-month chapel services starting at 10:30 AM are January 11, February 8, March 14, April 11, May 9, and June 13. Please mark these dates on your calendar, and we very much look forward to celebrating Shabbat with you!

## **COMMUNITY OF ACTION CONTINUES TO FOCUS**

#### On Literacy and Education

#### **Literacy Council and TBA Work Together**

Consider the following facts:

- 1 in 7 County residents struggle with low literacy.
- 30% of adults in the County face language barriers to employment.
- Over 100,000 County residents do not have a high school diploma.
- Less than 50 % of working black and Hispanic families in the county earn a living wage

Two November events sponsored jointly by the Literacy Council of Montgomery County and TBA's Community of Action helped to introduce Temple members to the Council's adult education program. November's presentations were on the Council's best known program -- to train ESL tutors. This program, which matches trained individuals with persons wishing to improve their English speaking skills, is in critical need of tutors to fill the backlog of over 150 adults waiting to be matched. While TBA's efforts garnered eight new recruits, many more are needed. For anyone interested in finding out more about ESL tutoring or training contact raul@lcmcmd.org

Those attending the first evening of the two-part program learned not only about ESL tutoring opportunities but also about the Council's other initiatives, including GED-preparation; basic literacy, LC Chat (English conversational classes), and workplace literacy. Under the workplace literacy initiative, the Literacy Council partners with local businesses and organizations to provide literacy instruction and vocational training to low-skilled employees, as well as resume-building and vocational training to job-seeking students.

On February 13, 2020 at 7:00 p.m. at Beth Ami, the Community of Action and the Literacy Council will be sponsoring a Roundtable on Achieving Equity through Adult Education. Representatives from the business community, education and local government

will share their ideas on how adult education can be a game changer for previously under-served Montgomery County residents. We will also try to run a short information session for prospective volunteers that evening if there is enough interest. ## Kirwan Commission Update - The State of Maryland Schools

Working with Strong Schools Maryland and other groups such as MoCo Women and AIM (Action in Montgomery), the Community of Action has advocated at meetings with county and state representatives for the full funding of the Kirwan Commission's Recommendations, which were passed by the General Assembly:

- 1) Invest in high quality early childhood education and care
- 2) Elevate teachers and school leaders (raise both pay and status)
- 3) Create a world-class instructional system enabling most students to achieve college or career readiness
- 4) Provide more support to students who need it the most in terms of special education, limited English proficiency, and poverty
- 5) Ensure excellence through accountability.

The question at this stage is will the General Assembly have enough votes to override the almost certain veto by the governor, fearing a possible increase in taxes to fully fund the commission's agenda. To help advocate for Kirwan, contact Lisa Fuller at lisamocowomen@gmail.com.

#### **South Lake Elementary School**

The Community of Action continues to support the school's efforts before the Board of Education and County Council to maintain its #1 priority for renovation, as promised in October by the MCPS School Superintendent Jack Smith. Added pressure has begun to shorten the timeline for permitting and construction to an earlier move-in date than 2024.

The Temple's Tikkun Olam committee has continued to support the school through its annual coat and sock and holiday gift drives. During the fall term over 30 students participated in afterschool art classes sponsored by the Community of Action. The winter term is already in full swing with an equally strong enrollment. and promoted we, Reform Jews from

North America and from around the world, must be represented by a large, strong, vocal and influential delegation.

To promote in Israel religious pluralism, gender equality, and minority rights; to advocate for asylum seekers and sound environmental policies; to put forward initiatives that nurture civil society, economic justice and prospects for peace; to gain access to vital resources to support Reform Judaism in Israel and around the world ... we all must vote in the upcoming World Zionist Congress elections!

Each adult member of our congregation - any Jewish person over the age of 18 - can vote. By doing so, you, too, can have a voice in the only Israeli political arena where Jewish communities outside of Israel have a real opportunity to influence Israeli society and policies.

Temple Beth Ami has always been a leader in these election efforts. We have generated significant numbers of votes each time. Rabbi Luxemburg has represented us at two previous WZCongresses. Once more, we need to step up and be counted ... in even greater numbers than before.

#### **Box Tops for Education**

A major change has been announced for the way Box Tops for Education (BTE) coupons are processed and dollars credited to schools. No more clipping small coupons and sending them to schools to consolidate and forward to a central processing site! Paper is so 20th Century. Electronics are 21st Century!

The new process will involve having each shopper register online to donate to a school. Then, when a participating product is bought, the consumer uses a smartphone app to scan the store's sales receipt. If all works correctly, the app will credit all the participating products that were bought, at 10 cents each, to the school. Very cost-effective. And no hand-counting coupons and shipping them to a central facility where they are recounted and a check issued to the school.

The new system does require consumers to own a smartphone, pre-register, and remember to scan sales receipts.

This summer, manufacturers started converting to the smartphone coupon. BTE labels now in consumer pantries or store inventory will still be honored if presented before the expiration date, which is printed on the coupon. So, until the day when no coupons are available, we will still have a collection box for those little pink labels in the Temple lobby.






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

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
