HIAS Refugee Shabbat

Rabbi Weiss welcomed Melanie Nezer, Senior VP for Public Affairs at HIAS, as the guest speaker for TBA's HIAS Refugee Shabbat on March 11. Melanie's presentation was quite passionate and began with a discussion of the crisis in Ukraine and HIAS's efforts to work with other humanitarian groups to address the many needs of the Ukrainian people.

Melanie shared that HIAS was founded more than 100 years ago and has conducted humanitarian programs across the globe. While initially focused on helping Jewish refugees, about 20 years ago HIAS shifted to using its Jewish heritage, experience, and values to help all refugees, and not only when the Jewish community is threatened. As HIAS likes to say, "We used to help refugees because **they** were Jewish; now we help them because **we** are Jewish."

Melanie expressed appreciation for TBA's efforts on behalf of refugees, including recently welcoming and providing ongoing support to two Afghan families. HIAS served as the refugee resettlement agency for one of these families.
