HIGHLIGHT OF THE MONTH

SPRING CLEANING FOR A GOOD CAUSE

On Sunday, May 1, the Tikkun Olam Committee hosted the second "Spring Cleaning for a Good Cause" event. Despite the pouring rain, TBA members and others in our community came in droves to drop off donations to help the needy in our area.

Within 2 hours we collected:

- 71 boxes and 19 bags of books for Friends of the Library
- 1½ truckloads of household goods, professional clothing, and furniture for **A Wider Circle**
- 122 pairs of eyeglasses and 37 pairs of sunglasses for the Lions Club
- 1 huge box of art supplies for South Lake Elementary School
- · A full van of sports equipment for Leveling the Playing Field
- A car load of non-perishable kosher food for the Capital Kosher Pantry
- More than 2 huge bins of clothing for Interfaith Works and the Recycle Clothing Center
- 32 cell phones and 6 tablets for Secure the Call
- 4 boxes of pet-related items for the Montgomery County Humane Society
- 4 bins of non-perishable food for the **Manna Food Center** (This included donations from the Temple's 50th Anniversary Gala the evening before.)
- More than 1,500 pounds of shredded recyclable paper

We are so thankful to all of the TBA and student volunteers, community organizations, and donors who contributed to another successful event!

REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT RECAP

The Temple Beth Ami Refugee Resettlement Group continues our partnership with NNIA (New Neighbors Interfaith Alliance) and our work with Afghan refugee families. On May 17, the fourth family we are supporting settled into their new home in Silver Spring, close to a relative, which is very comforting and helpful for that family. News from the other three families includes these wonderful highlights:

- One father has started a full-time job with a house painting company and reports that he enjoys his colleagues, loves the work and the 6 a.m.-3 p.m. day is great!
- Another father, who has an MD degree, has started taking courses to train to be a Certified Medical Assistant, which will enable him to reenter the medical field.
- All the parents are taking English classes. Two parents are taking the class in person at Montgomery college and have learned how to commute by bus!
- The school-age children will be attending summer school, and some of the children will attend the City of Rockville summer camp, too! Summer camp was paid for by donations to NNIA and generous financial aid from the City of Rockville.
- One child, who attends Julius West Middle School, made the Honor Roll for the 3rd quarter -- her very first quarter attending a school in United States! She and her family are so proud of her academic accomplishments!

GET TO KNOW SOME OF OUR PARTNERS



Like Temple Beth Ami, Community Reach of Montgomery County celebrated its 50th Anniversary this year. Beth Ami's involvement with Reach goes back to 1979, when Reach was called Community Ministries of Rockville (CMR). Over the years, congregants have volunteered in all five of Reach's areas of social service: health care, housing, financial emergency assistance, education for immigrants, and eldercare.

Most notably, a dedicated committee of Beth Ami congregants invested years of effort to help Reach establish its Mansfield Kaseman Health Clinic in downtown Rockville. The clinic provides low-cost health care to about 1,000 Montgomery County adults who are uninsured, or insured with Medicaid or Medicare.

For decades, Temple volunteers delivered meals every Thursday to the 36 men living at the Chase Shelter, which was operated by Reach from its opening in 1986 to 2010.

Debbie Jacobs is the TOC's representative on Reach's Faith Advisory Committee, an interfaith group of lay and clergy leaders from local congregations who work together and share ideas. Throughout the year, Beth Ami volunteers prepare and deliver meals to the women living at Rockland House and the men living at Jefferson House, both permanent supportive homes for individuals experiencing homelessness. Each December, our congregants deliver Christmas Dinner Baskets to Reach Holiday Giving clients. Pre-pandemic, Gan Ami families prepared snack bags for the children of adult learners in English Language classes provided by Reach's Language Outreach Program.
